- Bake Sale—Bake Sale is on the calendar for May 4th and 5th. These dates may conflict with Confirmation. The church office will be consulted.



#16 Jesus as the Lamb of God

The title **Lamb of God** (in Latin **Agnus Dei**) appears in the Gospel of John, with the exclamation of John the Baptist: "Behold the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world" in John 1:29 when he sees Jesus. John the Baptist's other proclamation in John 1:34: "I have borne witness that this is the Son of God" and the descent of the Holy Spirit as a dove in John 1:32 reinforce each other to establish the divine element of the Person of Christ. The proclamation "who takes away the sin of the world" begins the unfolding of the salvation theme of the redemptive and sacrificial death of Jesus followed by his resurrection which is built upon in other proclamations such as "this is indeed the Savior of the world" uttered by the Samaritans in John 4:42. In Christian teachings, *Lamb of God* refers to Jesus Christ in his role of the perfect sacrificial offering. These teachings emphasize that Jesus chose to suffer in Calvary as a sign of his full obedience to the will of his Father.

HAIL, HOLY QUEEN

Hail, Holy Queen, Mother of Mercy, our life, our sweetness and our hope. To thee do we cry, poor banished children of Eve. To thee do we send up our sighs, mourning and weeping in this valley of tears.
